Senate Approves \$2 Trillion Stimulus Package

The U.S. <u>Senate unanimously approved</u> a historic \$2 trillion economic stimulus package early this morning, after a day of wrangling votes. The U.S. House is set to vote on the bill, dubbed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, Friday morning.

Here's a look at some of the bill's key provisions for WCMA members.

General Business Aids

- Employers would be able to delay the payment of their 2020 payroll taxes until 2021 and 2022.
- The bill also allows businesses to carry back losses from 2018, 2019, and 2020 to the previous five years, providing access to immediate tax refunds.
- Employers of all sizes that suffer economic hardship due to coronavirus but continue to pay employees that are furloughed may be eligible for a 50 percent credit on up to \$10,000 of wages paid to those employees.
- The bill would provide eight weeks of cash-flow assistance through 100 percent federally-guaranteed loans to small employers who maintain their payroll during this emergency. If the employer maintains payroll, the portion of the loans used for covered payroll costs, interest on mortgage obligations, rent, and utilities would be forgiven. This proposal is retroactive to February 15, to help bring workers who may have already been laid off back onto payrolls. SBA is required to enact this benefit within 15 days of the bill is signed into law.
- For six months, the Small Business Administration is required to pay all principal, interest, and fees on all existing SBA loan products including 7(a), Community Advantage, 504, and Microloan programs.

Direct Aid to Individuals/Unemployment Benefits

- Americans will be eligible for a one-time tax rebate check of \$1,200 per individual and \$500 per child for those with a valid SSN. There are no earned income or tax liability requirements to receive these rebate checks. The full rebate amount is available for those with incomes at or below \$75,000 for individuals, \$112,500 for head of household, and \$150,000 for married couples. The payments scale down by income, phasing out at \$99,000 for singles and \$198,000 for couples without children.
- The bill makes unemployment benefits more generous by adding a \$600/week across-the-board payment increase through the end of July. In addition, the bill provides an additional 13 weeks of benefits beyond what states typically allow.

Industry-Specific Measures

• The bill allocates a total of \$50 billion in funding to USDA, much of which is earmarked for farm relief programs. There is an allocation of \$450 million to the Commodity Assistance Program, and more details on this will follow.
