# **COVID-19 Boosts Dairy Consumption in China**

A <u>new report</u> shows the COVID-19 outbreak has boosted consumption of dairy products in China, with 96 percent of the population believing dairy to have immunity-boosting benefits via lactoferrin. Over 40 percent of people in China were found to have increased their dairy consumption and diversified the types of dairy they ate and drank during the pandemic. Chinese officials have actively promoted dairy consumption in recent months, advising daily intake of approximately 10 ounces.

## **USDA Reports \$6.8 Billion in CFAP Payments**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) this week reported via its <u>Coronavirus Food</u> <u>Assistance Program (CFAP) dashboard</u> that it has processed nearly \$6.8 billion in payments to more than 499,000 farmers. The amount directed to dairy farmers - \$1.3 billion - is virtually unchanged this week.

## Wisconsin to Reopen Application for Farm Aid

The Wisconsin Department of Revenue (WDOR) will accept <u>new applications for the Wisconsin</u> <u>Farm Support Program</u> beginning Monday, August 10. Created by Governor Tony Evers to distribute \$50 million in federal funding to farmers affected by the pandemic, the program paid out \$41.6 million in \$3,500 increments to nearly 12,000 producers in July. Only farmers who did not receive support in the first round of the program are eligible for a payment in the second round.

## Senators Call on Trade Officials, USDA to Protect Common Food Names

A bipartisan group of U.S. senators, led by Sens. John Thune (R-SD), Debbie Stabenow (D-MI), Tammy Baldwin (D-WI), and Thom Tillis (R-NC) are calling on U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer and U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue to fight for protections for U.S. exporters using common food names, including parmesan and feta. In a <u>letter delivered last</u> <u>Thursday</u>, the 61 co-signers request that trade officials consider common food name protections a core policy objective in all current and future negotiations.

WCMA lobbied lawmakers to join this cause, and will continue to advocate for members' interests, fighting the unfair use of geographic indications to limit the sale of American-made cheese abroad.

## **Comments on USDA Dietary Guidelines Due August 13**

The U.S. Departments of Agriculture and Health and Human Services are accepting public comments on the <u>scientific report of the 2020 Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee</u> now through August 13. The report will guide the development of federal nutrition policies and sets the basis for government food aid programs.

## USDA Study Finds High Rate of Dairy Farm Consolidation in Midwest, Northeast

A <u>study</u> from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Economic Research Service finds that <u>the</u> <u>pace of consolidation in dairy exceeds the rate seen in most other agriculture sectors</u>. The USDA report found that 20 years ago, farms with 2,000 cows or more only represented 4.5 percent of U.S. milk production. By 2016, that group represented 35.2 percent of all milk production. The consolidation trend is most concentrated in the Midwest and Northeast, particularly in Wisconsin, Minnesota, New York, and Pennsylvania.

# **Court Tosses Petition to End California Milk Quota**

A petition to terminate the 50-year-old California milk quota system was deemed "not legally valid" last week by a judge in the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CFA). <u>The ruling is seen</u> as a victory for California dairy farms, including smaller family-run farms, which own most of the milk quota. In June, dairy farmers testified in a CFA hearing stating the termination of the milk quota system, worth hundreds of millions of dollars, would be financially catastrophic for the industry.

# Apply for DBIA Grants By Friday, August 14



WCMA members are encouraged to apply now for <u>Dairy</u> <u>Business Innovation Alliance (DBIA) direct-to-business</u> <u>grant opportunities</u>. Applications are due Friday, August 14, and awards will be made in September.

Coordinated in partnership by the Center for Dairy Research (CDR) at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and WCMA, DBIA has \$220,000 to distribute via a competitive grants process in 2020. Dairy farmers and processors in Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, and Wisconsin may apply for awards of up to \$20,000.
