

Moderna Reports Vaccine 94.5 Percent Effective

On Monday, pharmaceutical company Moderna reported its coronavirus <u>vaccine is 94.5 percent</u> <u>effective</u>, just a week after similarly positive news from Pfizer on its version version. Pfizer has already made plans for a <u>pilot vaccine delivery program</u> in New Mexico, Rhode Island, Tennessee, and Texas.

Both Moderna and Pfizer are expected to formally apply within weeks to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for emergency authorization to deploy their vaccines, with federal officials saying Moderna and Pfizer could produce 20 million doses by sometime in December. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention officials have noted that priority access will be given to health care workers.

Vaccine May Squeeze Available Dry Ice Supply, Causing Concern for Dairy Industry

Some COVID-19 <u>vaccines currently in development</u> rely on genetic material which must be kept at an extremely cold temperature, approximately -80 degrees Celsius, to remain viable. An as-yet uncalculated amount of dry ice will be needed to develop, transport, and store COVID-19 vaccine for broad distribution, with demand building in the near future.

This may be cause for concern for the dairy industry, which relies on dry ice for the production and distribution of cultures, which must be frozen and stored at sub-zero temperatures until they are used.

WCMA members are this week advocating at the state and federal level to ensure that an essential amount of dry ice, approximately 350,000 pounds per week, be reserved for culture manufacturers and distributors to ensure uninterrupted dairy processing. WCMA will keep members informed of major developments, and ways to engage on this issue, if necessary.

Amid Surge, Many States Issue New Orders

With the United States reporting <u>one million new COVID-19 cases</u> in the past week alone, some governors are issuing orders designed to curb the spread of the disease.

California

Governor Gavin Newsom has moved most of California's larger counties back into the <u>most</u> <u>restrictive reopening tier</u>, meaning indoor dining is again banned. Newsom also clarified that face masks must be worn at all times outside one's home, noted he was considering curfews, and announced emergency health care facilities - field hospitals - are now being prepared.

lowa

Governor Kim <u>Reynolds announced</u> Monday night that all lowans over the age of two will now be required to wear masks when indoors, and that all indoor gatherings are limited to 15 people, for at least the next three weeks.

Michigan

Governor Gretchen Whitmer announced Sunday a new series of <u>stay-at-home orders</u> which will remain in effect through December 9. They will close schools, ban indoor dining at bars and restaurants, and mandate that people work from home whenever possible.

New Mexico

Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham has issued a <u>two-week stay-at-home order</u>, requiring essential businesses to return to a 25 percent capacity policy and non-essential businesses to close.

New Jersey

Governor Phil Murphy has **issued orders** reducing indoor gatherings to a maximum of ten individuals, effective immediately, and limiting outdoor gatherings to 150 people, effective November 23.

North Dakota

Governor Doug Burgum has issued a <u>mask mandate</u>, effective through December 13.

Oregon

Governor Kate Brown has **issued an order** to close gyms and restaurants and limit indoor capacity at grocery stores and pharmacies, beginning tomorrow.

Wisconsin Court Hears Mask Mandate Challenge

The Wisconsin Supreme Court on Monday heard oral <u>arguments in a lawsuit</u> over Governor Tony Evers' statewide mask mandate. Those challenging the order note Evers issued it after his original public health emergency expired, which they believe to be illegal. Evers' attorneys argue he has the authority to issue multiple health emergencies. A ruling in the case is expected in several weeks.

New EU Tariffs Target U.S. Cheeses and MPC

Last week, the European Union (EU) initiated <u>\$4 billion in new tariffs</u> on a wide range of U.S. goods, including certain cheese types and milk protein concentrate. The World Trade Organization allowed the tariffs as part of a dispute settlement over U.S. subsidies to aircraft maker Boeing.

U.S. semi-soft cheeses (47-52% moisture) and fresh cheeses (including cream cheese), the top 2019 cheese export categories into the EU, now face an additional 25 percent tariff, as well as U.S. cheddar sold into the EU. Overall, the U.S. sold 615 million pounds of all cheese types into the EU in 2019.

U.S. milk protein concentrate (greater than 85% protein) also faces an additional 25% tariff. Exports of MPC to the EU have grown sharply in 2020 – with sales of 640,000 pounds through September – compared to 154,000 pounds in all of 2019. Members report this tariff will essentially end the ability of U.S. companies to sell MPC into the EU.

WCMA will share with federal legislators the negative impact of these new tariffs on the U.S. dairy industry.

USDA Awards String Cheese Contract

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced Friday a <u>successful bid</u> for the purchase of 718,200 pounds of mozzarella string cheese for distribution through March 2021. Apply for WCMA Scholarships Totaling \$15,000

The Wisconsin Cheese Makers Association is now accepting applications for five student scholarships worth a total of \$15,000.

In 2021, two students will be awarded the <u>WCMA Myron P. "Mike" Dean Cheese Industry Student</u> <u>Scholarship</u>, worth \$3,000 each. Any employee or child of an employee of a WCMA dairy manufacturing, processing, or marketing member company may apply.

Employees or children of employees at WCMA supplier member companies may apply for the <u>WCMA</u> <u>Cheese Industry Supplier Student Scholarship</u>. Three students will receive scholarship awards of \$3,000 each.

Preference for both scholarship awards will be given to candidates pursuing degrees and careers connected to the dairy industry. Well-qualified candidates will be currently attending a college, university, or technical school in the United States, or registered to attend a qualifying school.

Applicants must supply transcripts, a letter of recommendation, and a completed application form by Wednesday, February 17, 2021. Forms may be found at <u>WisCheeseMakers.org</u>, or can be directly requested from <u>WCMA Office & Member Service Manager Sara Schmidt</u>.


Successful applicants will be announced in March 2021, with awards made in September.
