### First Case of HPAI Detected in Wisconsin Dairy Herd



The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Trade and Consumer Protection (WDATCP) on Sunday announced Wisconsin's first case of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in a dairy herd in Dodge County. WDATCP officials noted the farm's processing partner had been notified, and both WDATCP and USDA reiterated that there is no concern about the safety of the commercial milk supply or consumer health.

Dairy cattle in a total of 18 states have been infected since the start of the outbreak in March 2024, but USDA has noted <u>very limited cases in a small number of states this year</u>. ### **Multiple States Tighten SNAP Restrictions in 2026**



Beginning in 2026, a growing number of states will tighten restrictions on the types of foods consumers can purchase using their Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has so far <a href="mailto:approved waivers">approved waivers</a> for 18 states including Idaho, Iowa, Indiana, South Dakota, and Texas, allowing them to restrict SNAP purchases of items such as soda, candy, and other processed foods.

Wisconsin lawmakers last month <u>proposed similar restrictions</u> in <u>Assembly Bill 180/Senate Bill 154</u>. WCMA is working on an <u>amendment</u> with the bill authors to safeguard dairy ingredients from possible unintended consequences of restrictions on candy in SNAP. WCMA language would assure that protein bars with dairy ingredients would not be categorized as candy.

Wisconsin legislators are also considering amending this proposed legislation to address the federal government's decision in July to increase the share that states will pay for SNAP administrative expenses from 50 percent to 75 percent. In Wisconsin, raising administrative costs will require a state investment upwards of \$30 million more per year. Members with questions may contact <a href="https://www.wcman.gov/wcman.gov

### **House Passes Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act**



The U.S. House has passed the Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act of 2025, sending the bill to President Trump's desk. The bill restores the option for schools participating in the National School Lunch Program to once again serve whole milk and 2% milk. The bill also clarifies that fluid milk no longer needs to be included in the overall saturated fat calculation for school meals. WCMA has advocated in support of this legislation. READ MORE...

### **Domestic Organic Investment Act Introduced in Congress**

U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin and Susan Collins, along with U.S. Representatives Andrea Salinas and Derrick Van Orden (pictured at far left with Adam Warthesen, Vice President of Government & Industry Affairs for WCMA member Organic Valley/CROPP Cooperative) introduced the Domestic Organic Investment Act last week. This bipartisan, bicameral bill would create competitive grants for organic producers and manufacturers to invest in increased storage, processing, aggregation, and distribution capacity. In a news release, Shawna Nelson, CEO of Organic Valley, called the bill "a positive step toward ensuring more organic food reaches



### **Trump Signs Executive Order to Investigate Food Price-Fixing**



Amid rising food costs nationwide, President Trump last week signed an executive order directing the Department of Justice and the Federal Trade Commission to investigate potential price-fixing in the U.S. food supply chain, particularly by foreign-controlled companies. The order singles out the meat processing, seed, fertilizer, and equipment industries - but not dairy - as being especially vulnerable to anticompetitive practices. READ MORE...

WCMA and the International Dairy Foods Association today applauded U.S. Reps. Bryan Steil (R-WI), Jim Costa (D-CA), Mark Pocan (D-WI), and Kristen McDonald Rivet (D-MI) for their testimony and letters in support of the CURD Act, which would create a federal definition for "natural cheese". In a joint news release, WCMA Executive Director John Umhoefer noted that the Association "stands ready to work with Congress to...secure enactment of this long-standing, commonly used definition - delivering greater transparency in the marketplace and certainty for the dairy industry."
