JOB OVERVIEW

EMS professionals respond to emergency calls, assess patients, provide medical treatment, and transport patients to medical facilities. There are many types of EMS departments including Voluntary, Government, Private Ambulances, Hospital Based, and Tribal. A few job duties of an EMS professional include:






ministering medications & providing life saving medical treatment

INTRODUCTION

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) is a vital component of healthcare that provides medical care to individuals in urgent situations. The EMS field is a fast-paced, high-pressure environment that requires **quick thinking, teamwork, and excellent communication skills**. Check out some of the differences between the different license levels below.



Emergency Medical Responders (EMRs) also known as Certified First Responders, provide lifesaving interventions, including **CPR, AED, and bleeding control** while awaiting additional EMS response and to assist higher level personnel at the scene.

Emergency Medical Responder (EMR)

Average Time: 2-3 months* Approximate Program Cost: \$500*

Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)

Average Time: 3-4 months* Approximate Program Cost: \$1,500* Emergency Medical Technician-Basic (EMT-B) are trained in the use of AED, CPR, **Oxygen Administration, bandaging, splinting**, non-visualized airways, glucose level testing and administration of life saving medications.





AEMTs are responsible for providing basic emergency treatment for **respiratory**, **trauma and cardiac emergencies**, as well as obstructed airways. AEMTs are also trained to administer some medications, as well as intravenous fluids. Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT)

Average Time: 6-12 months* Approximate Program Cost: \$2,500*

Paramedic

Critical Care & Community Paramedic Endorsements Available*

Average Time: 1-2 years* Approximate Program Cost: \$7,500* Paramedics are **highly trained medical professionals** who are educated to carry out some of the duties of **a physician.** Paramedics can examine, evaluate and treat patients with equipment and medications usually only found in the emergency department of a hospital.



WHAT DOES THAT LOOK LIKE?

While many associate EMS with flashy helicopters and ambulances, it is far from just a trip to the emergency department. EMS is a system of carefully coordinated systems and trained response personnel through multiple agencies and systems. A comprehensive EMS system is ready for any kind of emergency.

EMS Does Not Exist in Isolation

EMS integrates with other services and systems intended to enhance the community's health and safety. EMS is the crossroads of healthcare, public health, emergency management, and public safety. Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and Paramedics respond to emergency calls, perform life saving medical services, and transport patients to medical facilities.





What is the Star of Life?

The Star of Life is a blue, six-pointed star, internationally known as a symbol that represents Emergency Medical Services.

The six branches are symbols of the six main tasks executed by rescuers through the emergency chain. The serpent and staff in the symbol portray the staff of Aesculapius, an ancient Greek physician defined as the god of medicine. The staff represents medicine and healing, with the skin-shedding serpent being indicative of renewal.

STEP 1: FIND THE EMS TRAINING SITE CLOSEST TO YOU

STEPS TO PROTECT YOURSELF & OTHERS

EMTs and paramedics have a duty to care for themselves and their health in order to protect the health and safety of the people they serve. There are a few health requirements you should keep in mind as you start your EMS career journey:



Vaccinations

EMS personnel are often required to receive vaccinations such as Hepatitis B, MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella), Tetanus, and Influenza. DHS does not require EMS providers to be vaccinated against COVID-19 to practice, but it is highly recommended.



TB Screening

EMS personnel are also **required to be screened for TB** (**tuberculosis**) upon hire to prevent the spread of this serious disease. Wisconsin DHS does not require regular TB screening after the initial test.

Physical Health

EMS personnel must be able to perform physically demanding tasks, including carrying patients and equipment, for extended periods. While not required by DHS, a physical fitness exam may be required for an employer.



Mental Health

EMS personnel may be exposed to traumatic events and high-stress situations that can take a toll on their mental health. It is important for EMS personnel to prioritize their mental health and seek help if needed.
